



## Train to Teach Roadshows Frequently Asked Questions

Can I bring someone with me who is not interested in teaching?

Yes, you are welcome to bring anyone with you to the Roadshow and they do not need to be registered as they will receive a visitors badge on the day. We do ask, however, that they do not attend the presentations if they are particularly busy as seating is limited.

I graduated a few years ago. I have been thinking about a career change though – should I attend?

Yes!

We recognise the wealth of experience and knowledge the people switching from another career can bring to the classroom. This Roadshow will give you the opportunity to talk to a teaching expert and receive one-to-one advice on your training options and also chat to a teacher who has made a career change.

I am interested in becoming a teacher, but have concerns about the costs involved in further study.

A range of incentives and financial support such as bursaries and scholarships are available both during and after your training. There are lots of different routes into a career in teaching and attending a Train to Teach Roadshow would give you the chance to talk to regional providers about how best to manage your situation.

I am an overseas trained teacher. Is this the right event for me?

I am not a trained teacher, but my degree is from overseas. Does this mean that I should not attend?
